 Conceived and implemented in 1991

Originally known as:
 Colorado Library Card

- A little history...
  - Revisited in 2017
    - Revised/refreshed program guidelines to address library technology and privacy landscape changes
    - Promotional/awareness campaign to address staff and patron confusion

- CLC Member Libraries
  - Extend lending privileges
  - Eliminate non-resident fees
  - Establish process for issuing barcodes
  - Educate library staff about CLC
  - Promote CLC among community

• Full Access/CLC: Colorado residents 18 years or older with photo ID and valid Colorado mailing address may register for a library card. To acquire a library card for a child under 18 years of age, the child's parent or legal guardian must present a photo ID and must accompany the child to the library. Bemis Public Library participates in Colorado Libraries Collaborate (CLC), enabling Colorado residents who do not live in Littleton to register for full access cards with photo ID.

Residents in PCCLD's service area are expected to register for a library card to use PCCLD's public use computers. Colorado residents living outside of PCCLD's service area may be eligible to apply for a nonresident library through the Colorado Libraries Collaborate (CLC) program. Nonresident library card holders have the same access to PCCLD's public computers as resident library card holders and do not need to obtain a temporary visitor pass.

B. Colorado Libraries Collaborate Card

PPLD participates in the network of libraries throughout the state that make up the Colorado Libraries Collaborate (CLC) program. Through the CLC program, member libraries extend lending privileges to patrons of other CLC member libraries. State residents outside of PPLD boundaries may obtain library cards at any participating library. A PPLD non-resident card is issued with borrowing privileges for physical items and remote access to some online resources. Access to other resources and most licensed databases is only available to CLC cardholders within PPLD facilities. Interlibrary loans and purchase requests are not available to CLC cardholders.
